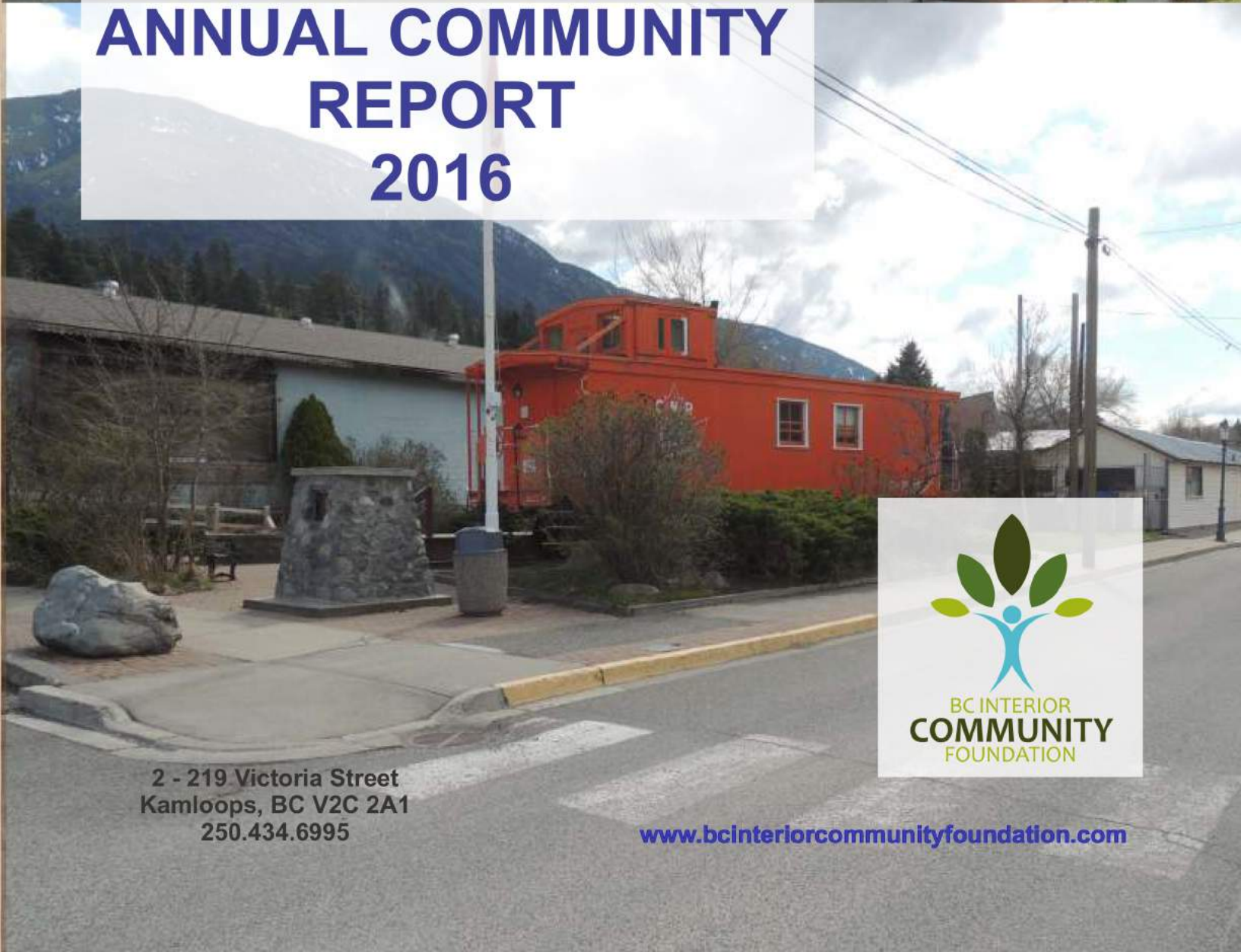

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY FOUNDATION?

A community foundation is a vehicle for people of all means to make a lasting difference in their community. The central purpose of a community foundation is to serve the needs and philanthropic aims of donors who wish to better their community, now and in the future. Community foundations do this by providing donors with flexible, efficient, and tax-effective ways to ensure their charitable giving achieves the greatest possible impact.

The concept of a community foundation is as ingenious as it is simple - it is a means to build, over time, substantial endowment funds for a community through contributions large and small.

Because these contributions are endowed, they are never spent. Instead, they are permanently invested to produce income. The income earned is then used to help meet the community's charitable needs - from social work to art and culture. So gifts to a community foundation continue to benefit your community forever. This is philanthropy in its broadest sense.

A community foundation does not usually conduct programs of its own. Rather, it supports new or existing programs of other non-profit organizations and agencies. It can also serve as a neutral convener, bringing diverse opinions and players together for the good of the whole community.

But a community foundation's principal function remains that of serving donors and their community by building permanent endowed funds for philanthropic purposes.

Donors like you may set up individual funds, in your own name or the name of a loved one, and have essentially as little or as much as control you wish in determining which charities benefit from your fund.

Or, you may choose to contribute to a variety of existing funds, set up to serve particular purposes. Each community foundation also has a general endowment fund, the income from which is distributed by the community foundation's board of directors to address needs and opportunities in your community as they change over time.

A community foundation is governed by a local board of directors chosen for their knowledge of the community and designed to be representative of a broad cross-section of the community. The directors further possess expertise in the many areas of management necessary to carry out the stewardship functions of the foundation.

A community foundation is a tax-exempt organization under the Canadian Revenue Agency. All contributions are tax deductible.

A community foundation represents a wide variety of ideas and interests of individual donors who have united in a common purpose - the bettering of their community both now and in the future.

Whatever your charitable intentions, there are ways to achieve them through your gifts to your community foundation.

Of course the financial well being of the Foundation is very important. The highlights of our growth in our endowed base, and the amount of grant money available for distribution is depicted in graph form for the last five years. The actual audited financial statements for 2016 are available on request.

Community Foundations across Canada, and there are close to 200 of them, are very unique in that they are structured in such a way that they build endowment funds to help their communities forever. They work with individuals, families, corporations, service groups and charities within their communities creating permanent legacies. In this way a Community Foundation can

benefit all areas of their community. All of them have terrific support from volunteers which helps to keep their administration costs very low.

The BC Interior Community Foundation is well aware that many citizens in the communities are not familiar with the Foundation. Due to our low operating budget we have relied on word of mouth, one of the most effective advertising tools, to help spread our message. We also find that when people understand our Mission they become very interested in our role in the communities.

The Foundation is always striving to increase its endowment base. There are some interesting national statistics that indicate that only 7% of Canadians have named a charity in their will and yet about 40%, when asked, said they would leave a gift if they were asked to. Therefore it is important that once people understand the purpose of a community foundation we ask if they would like to leave a gift to a worthy cause. The Foundation will never know if we don't ask!

Going forward the BC Interior Community Foundation is going to expand its awareness with the public in our communities. By being successful at this, and asking, will enable the endowed base to grow so that more funds can be returned to the communities by way of grants to help the communities for many years ahead. Let us all do our part to help the citizens within the Thompson and South Cariboo areas benefit from the great positive and lasting work that the Foundation does.

Kamloops Child Development Centre (KCDC) has a 49-year history of providing quality childcare to the greater Kamloops community. In keeping with their history and dedication to inclusivity, the children at the Centre include typical children and those with special needs. They offer 107 childcare spaces that are utilized by 154 families of a diverse clientele, including families of a lower socio-economic demographic, high-risk children and children with behaviours and exceptionalities. Simply speaking, they serve some

of the most vulnerable families in our area.

It has been over ten years since KCDC updated its playground. During this time the centre adopted a nature-based educational philosophy that includes ensuring the majority of its programming happens outside, embracing nature. The curriculum is designed to allow

flexible, spontaneous activities based on the children's expressed interests. Their early childhood educators plan the environment to guide the children's learning, enhance their knowledge and meet their individual developmental needs.

Says KCDC Director of Education, Helen Blair, "moving the children's activities outside allows them to regain control over their activities and become responsible for their

own learning and growth. Natural playgrounds aim to inspire active, imaginative and self-directed outdoor play.

They're made out of wood, sand and water — those same elements that you would find in the mountains, at the beach or in the forest."

Their fundraising campaign was in full swing when Tangie Genshorek and Cam MacQuarrie of Scaled Space Design got involved. The talented couple came together with KCDC to create a design overview of the new forest playground. The natural design includes a tree house and water feature inspired by our local surroundings. In order to see this project through to completion the group has set a goal of \$100,000. It's a lofty goal but they're thinking to the future. For one thing, natural playgrounds are the best choice in a tight economy because they use natural resources in their basic form, and do not require components that are not easily replaced by nature. Environmentally, they have a lower carbon footprint too, as materials used for them are not manufactured and are generally available locally.

Many others in the community, including BC Interior Community Foundation (BCICF), can see the benefits and

have jumped in to help with this daunting project. KCDC received a partial funding grant for their water feature, which for the children is sure to be the biggest attraction, from BCICF; with support from parents, staff and friends they raised almost \$40,000 at the 2016 and 2017 annual Dandelion Galas; and many, community groups have donated

There is a worldwide movement to increase children's experiences with nature. "Science has shown that when we connect with nature, we're smarter, healthier and even more generous," says Helen. "Our Forest Playground is a dream come true for our centre. It's the space where our vision becomes a reality."

EUReKA!

The EUReKA! Science Program is a not-for-profit, student-led organization that operates out of Thompson Rivers University. Our goal is to provide hands-on science outreach for all kids so as to increase interest and literacy in the STEM fields among youth. Throughout May and June, we try to go



where the kids are by going right to their elementary schools in Kamloops, in the surrounding area, and within First Nation's communities. This is achieved in part by our aptly named "Go Where Kids Are" Initiative in which we collaborate with Actua Canada, and by our Outreach Camps.

EUReKA! Outreach Camps are our main connection to the community at large through May and June. In 2016, EUReKA! received many generous donations from various community groups, including the BC Interior Community Foundation. The BCICF's donation towards our Outreach Camps aided us immensely in how many kids we were able to reach and helped to facilitate the camps in a smoother fashion.

EUReKA! is very grateful to collaborate with organizations such as the BCICF so that we can ensure the next generation of kids can be actively interested and engaged in science, technology, engineering, and math.

NORKAM ALUMNI FUND "THE PAST SUPPORTING THE FUTURE"

NorKam Senior Secondary School provides a diverse student population from across School District 73, a rich and comprehensive educational experience. From our Trades Center to our International Baccalaureate program to the varied extracurricular activities students are being given opportunities to explore public education like never before.

With students being given these opportunities, they are also requiring a chance to explore these programs after their time in public education. NorKam Senior Secondary School has partnered with the BC Interior Community Foundation since 2000 to build 11 Endowment Funds supporting Scholarships and Bursaries for students graduating at NorKam Senior. The latest fund is called the NorKam Alumni Fund. This fund has been established to not only provide students support through scholarships and bursaries but to also provide assistance for things like field trips, support materials above and beyond those currently provided, and the ability to participate in the many and varied programs at NorKam.

This past year a volunteer group of former students, teachers, administrators and other interested persons has formed a steering committee to build the NorKam Alumni Fund, a fund that will complement the existing scholarship and bursary funds. The Steering Committee has set a goal of \$300,000 and encourages all NorKam Grads and the North Kamloops business community to support our cause. "The past supporting the Future"

Brandon Gives Back

Lisa Tavender and Kirk Hein had the misfortune of losing their son Brandon in 2011 at the young age of 19. Due to this loss Brandon's mom, Lisa Tavender, wanted to find a way to remember and honour him. Brandon was a really good kid and always had a huge smile. He touched people of all ages; from little ones who referred to him as "uncle B" to seniors who he went out of his way to help. Many saw Brandon as an old soul.

Brandon loved the outdoors, especially fishing, so it only made sense to have a fishing derby; gathering family and friends to remember Brandon and raise money for the Brandon Kirk Hein Memorial Fund which Lisa and Kirk started with the Foundation in 2012. Brandon had been a student at Valleyview Secondary School so the Fund was setup to support Valleyview Secondary School graduates.

After four successful fishing derbies, seven awards have been distributed totaling \$5,500 and Lisa says "we now have a significant amount in the fund to sustain future awards".

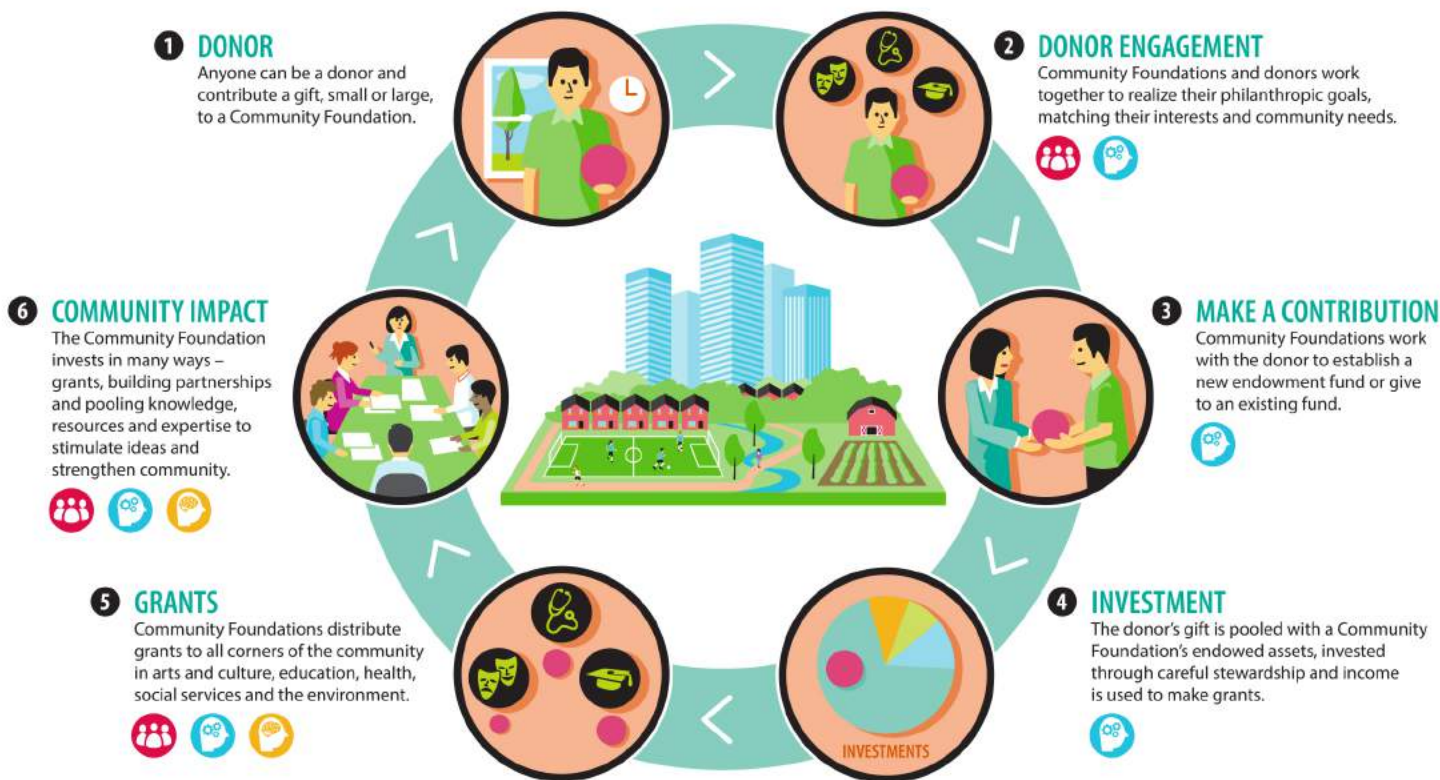

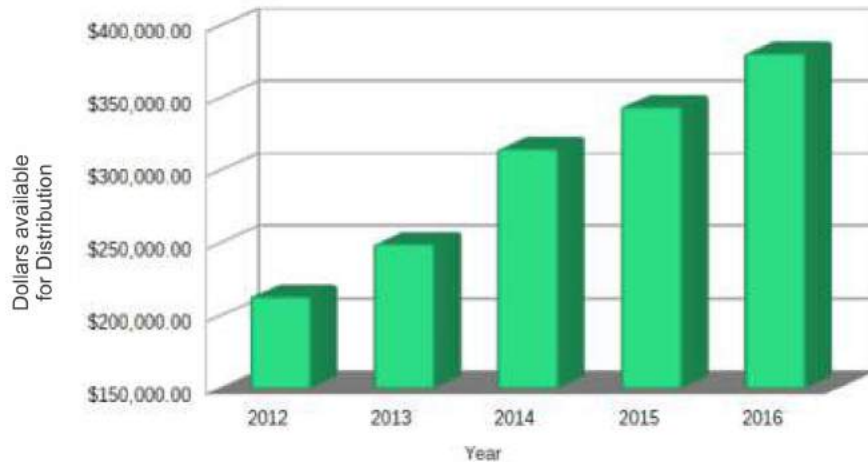

The primary role of the Foundation is to administer the endowed funds that the donors have so willingly started or contributed to so that the communities we serve are the beneficiaries. We all benefit as our endowment base increase means that the amounts for grants also increases. Grant applications must be received by April 1st and October 1st to receive funds from the discretionary funds. Grant distributions from donor advised funds have varying dates throughout the year.

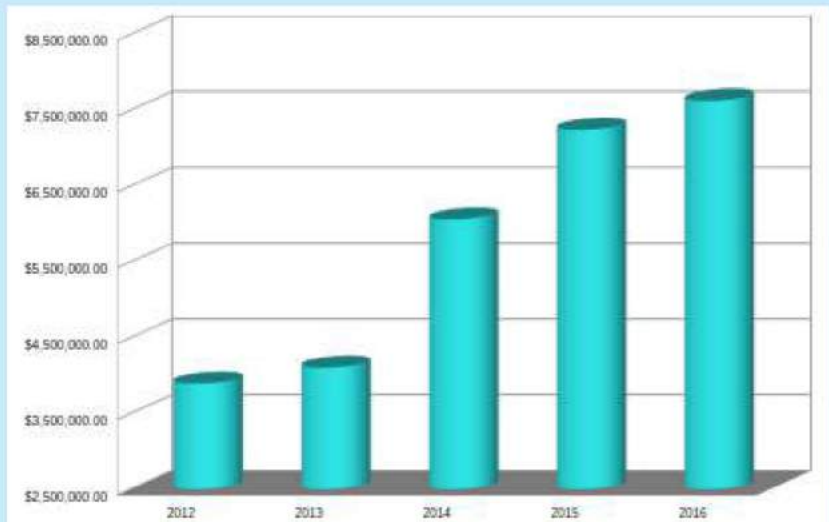


OUR ENDOWMENT FUNDS CONTINUE TO GROW

Last year the BCICF showed its commitment to improving the quality of life for youth in Kamloops by supporting the Whole Note, an innovative new project launched by the Kamloops Music Collective. Whole Note is a community-based initiative unique to Kamloops that supports youth musicians who face financial barriers, but are committed to fulfilling their music potential. Planned as a multi-year program beginning in Fall 2016, Whole Note provides a comprehensive, yet fun approach to music education through lessons, mentor ship and performance opportunities for students in Grades 7 through 10. Plans are also in place to expand grade levels and numbers of students in future years.

Whole Note was developed under the leadership of Kim Mangan, who has served as the Executive Director of the Kamloops Interior Summer School of Music (KISSM) for the past decade, along with guidance and encouragement from members of the KISSM board. In recognition of the breadth of music expertise and community spirit within Kamloops, the development of the program has also involved other local and provincial music, arts and culture organizations and individual supporters to nurture the concept along. From vision to implementation, Kim and the Whole Note team have spent countless hours developing this unique, accessible approach to music instruction and performance.
